Director's Report November 2023

The mission of Walden Academy is to provide an innovative learning environment that extends beyond the classroom. Science and challenging academics encourage students to collaborate and exceed in all aspects of life as modeled by family, school, and community.

I. LCAP Goal 1: Through the implementation of state academic content, performance, and ELD standards, Walden Academy will provide engaging and challenging learning opportunities in a broad course of study emphasizing science and instructed by highly qualified professionals with sufficient instructional material on a well maintained campus.

Conditions of Learning

1. Basic

A. Credentialed teachers

Teachers possess appropriate credentials for their assignments. We have 4 teachers without a clear credential who are currently enrolled in an induction program.

B. Access to standards-aligned instructional materials

We continue to provide standards-aligned material to all Walden Academy students.

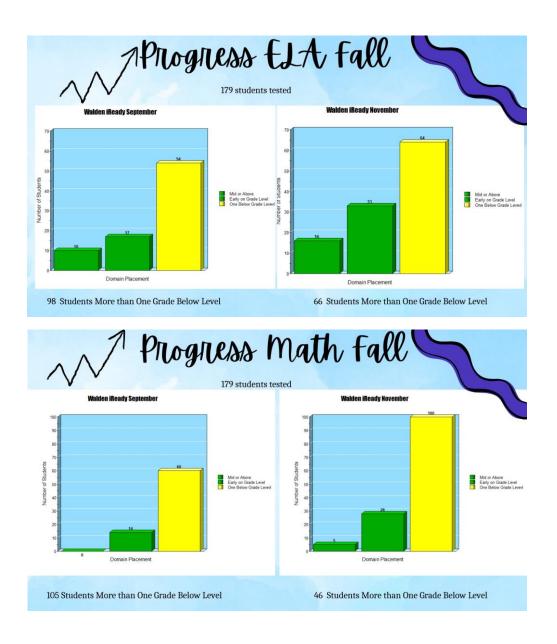
C. Facilities in good repair

Facilities remain in excellent condition.

2. State Standards Implementation---*English language development standards and academic content & performance standards*

A. Walk Through Data Summary and iReady Growth:

The school is still committed to individualized student support paired with high quality instruction on grade level standards. Due to testing and the resignation of our MTSS Coordinator, there is a dip in walkthrough data supporting tier 2 and 3 instruction. However, with testing, we were able to see growth in our students on state standards. Here are those results:



Engagement is still at 88.1%

The provided data on differentiation strategies reveals a diverse range of approaches in the educational setting. Approximately 25% of responses indicate a lack of specified strategies, while 12.5% emphasize the importance of visual examples, individual support, and ongoing assessment of student engagement. Similarly, 12.5% highlight ongoing assessment facilitated through Get More Math Software and individual student support. The combination of one-on-one aide support and question assistance when needed is also represented in 12.5% of the responses. Additionally, 12.5% of educators employ digital learning at the students' level, and the same percentage opt for a combination of one-on-one support and strategic grouping. This data underscores a commitment to diverse methodologies to meet the varied learning needs of students, with an overarching focus on ongoing assessment and individualized support.

3. Course Access---broad course of study

Broad Course of Study

- **A.** Students continue to receive a broad course of study in each classroom. Over the past month, middle schoolers worked on multicultural projects which were presented at our first ever Multicultural Night. Starting next week, Lexi Velazquez will be joining us twice a week to teach music in preparation for Christmas Song Fest on December 20th.
- **II. LCAP Goal 2:** Through the implementation of CCSS, Walden Academy will provide learning opportunities that result in increased academic achievement for all groups of students.

Pupil Outcomes

4. Student Achievement- We are working towards our school and classroom goals. Students took the iReady Diagnostic test this week, and we are using the data to drive instruction.

A. School Goals:

- 1. Walden will have 45% of students score on or above level on the CAASPP for the 2023/24 school year in ELA.
- 2. Walden will have 30% of students score on or above level on the CAASPP for the 2023/24 school year in Math.
- B. **Incentives for school goals**: We are proud of the above iReady testing growth. Along with testing, each grade level set classroom goals for growth for the second test. Classes that met their goals got to pie their teachers or teachers aides at Good Morning Walden. The classes with the most minutes on iReady got to pie me and Mr. Bobadilla. We will set new goals for our next iReady testing.
- **III.** LCAP Goal 3: A positive school climate with all stakeholders participating in activities which increase student engagement and parental involvement.

Engagement

- **5. Parent Involvement---**efforts to seek parent input in decision making & parent participation in programs for special need subgroups
 - **A.** I send out weekly newsletters to staff and to families each Friday. This is the River Hawk Weekly Review (staff) and the River Hawk Talk (families).

- **B.** I have sent a request for over 175 volunteer opportunities run through the school office. Volunteer work was encouraged at Back to School Night. I have also been honoring volunteers on our weekly River Hawk Talk. Julie Bell was our Volunteer of the Month
- **C.** We've been able to open the CARES store each Friday through the help of Parent Volunteers.
- **D.** I sent out a survey to parents and staff about our school. (see presentation)
- **E.** We will be having holiday spirit days the month of December and Rico will be rewarding the class with the most spirit at GMW.
- **6. Pupil Engagement---**attendance rates/chronic absenteeism
 - A. Attendance: Monitoring has commenced at the start of the year. We are averaging 96.21% average daily attendance.
- 7. School Climate---suspension/expulsion, school safety & connectedness
 - A. **Connectedness:** We have begun our Staff Recognition program. We are using referrals and celebrating 4-5 staff members each month.
 - **B. Behavior Management:** See additional report- Walkthrough and Behavioral Data.
 - **C. Positive Behavior Intervention Support:** Since the last meeting, students have earned 564 CARES cash for overall positive behavior, and 71 additional \$5 CARES cash for the specific CARES trait "Assertion". (Recorded by money spent in the CARES store).

This Pupil Suspension and Expulsion Policy (the "Policy") for Walden Academy ("School") has been established in order to promote learning and protect the safety and well-being of all students. When the Policy is violated, it may be necessary to suspend or expel a student from regular classroom instruction. At the same time, the School intends to provide effective interventions for pupils who engage in acts of problematic behavior to help them change their behavior and avoid exclusion from the School.

Staff shall enforce disciplinary rules and procedures fairly and consistently amongst all students. The Policy will be printed and distributed as part of the Student Handbook and will clearly describe discipline expectations. The School Director shall ensure that students and their parents/guardians are notified in writing upon enrollment of all discipline policies and procedures. The notice shall state that this Policy is available on request at the front office.

Discipline includes, but is not limited to, advising and counseling students, conferring with parents/guardians, detention during and after school hours, community service on or off campus, the use of alternative educational environments, suspension and expulsion. Corporal punishment shall not be used as a disciplinary measure against any student. Corporal punishment includes the willful infliction of, or willfully causing the infliction of, physical pain on a student. For purposes of the Policy, corporal punishment does not include an employee's use of reasonable force necessary to protect the employee, students, staff or other persons or to prevent damage to school property.

A student identified as an individual with disabilities or for whom the School has a basis of knowledge of a suspected disability pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities in Education Act ("IDEA") or who is qualified for services under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ("Section 504") is subject to the same grounds for suspension and expulsion and is accorded the same due process procedures applicable to regular education students except when federal and state law mandates additional or different procedures. The School will follow Section 504, the IDEA, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 ("ADA") and all applicable federal and state laws when imposing any form of discipline on a student identified as an individual with disabilities or for whom the School has a basis of knowledge of a suspected disability or who is otherwise qualified for such services or protections in according due process to such students.

Suspension

Definition

Suspension is the temporary removal of a pupil from class instruction for adjustment or disciplinary reasons. Suspension does not mean any of the following:

- Reassignment to another education program or class at the School where the pupil will receive continuing instruction for the length of day prescribed by the Board for pupils of the same grade level;
- > Referral to a certificated employee designated by the School Director to advise pupils;
- > Removal from the class, but without reassignment to another class for the remainder of the class period without sending the pupil to the School Director or designee.

Suspended students shall be excluded from all School and School-related activities unless otherwise agreed during the period of suspension. Violation may result in further disciplinary action.

The School shall consider suspension from School only when other means of correction fail to bring about proper

conduct or where the student's presence would constitute a danger to persons or property or seriously disrupt the educational process.

Authority

A teacher may suspend a student only from his/her classroom for the day of the suspension plus the following school day. The Director or his/her designee may suspend a student from class, classes or the school for a period not to exceed five days. The Director or his/her designee may extend a student's suspension pending final decision by the Board of Directors of the School on a recommendation for expulsion. On a recommendation for expulsion, the Board of Directors may suspend a special education student being considered for expulsion in accordance with the laws relating to expulsion of special education students.

A pupil may not be suspended or expelled for any of the acts enumerated in this Policy unless the act is related to school activity or school attendance of Walden Academy. A pupil may be suspended or expelled for acts that are enumerated in this Policy and related to school activity or attendance that occur at any time, including, but not limited to any of the following:

- While on school grounds
- While going to or coming from school
- > During the lunch period, whether on or off the school campus
- > During, or while going to or coming from a school sponsored activity
- > All acts related to school activity or school attendance occurring within the School

Grounds

The Director may use his/her discretion to provide alternatives to suspension or expulsion recommendations that are age appropriate and designed to address and correct the student's specific misbehavior. Alternatively, students may be suspended or recommended for expulsion for any of the following acts (whether completed, attempted or threatened) when it is determined the pupil:

- Caused physical injury to another person or willfully used force or violence upon the person of another, except in self-defense
- Possessed, sold or otherwise furnished any firearm, knife, explosive or other dangerous object unless, in the case of possession of any object of this type, the student had obtained written permission to possess the item from an authorized certificated school employee, with the Director's or designee's written concurrence
- ➤ Unlawfully possessed, used, sold or otherwise furnished, or was under the influence of, any controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety Code sections 11053-11058 (including, but not limited to, opiates, hallucinogenic substances, stimulants, depressants and narcotic drugs), alcoholic beverage or intoxicant of any kind.
- Unlawfully offered, arranged or negotiated to sell any controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety Code sections 11053-11058, alcoholic beverage or intoxicant of any kind, and then sold, delivered or otherwise furnished to any person another liquid substance or material and represented the same as a controlled substance, alcoholic beverage or intoxicant

- Possessed an imitation firearm, i.e., a replica of a firearm that is so substantially similar in physical properties to an existing firearm as to lead a reasonable person to conclude that the replica is a firearm

- o A post on a social network Internet Web site including, but not limited to:
 - Posting to or creating a burn page. "Burn page" means an Internet Web site created for the purpose of having one or more of the effects listed above.
 - Creating a credible impersonation of another actual pupil for the purpose of having one or more of the effects listed above. "Credible impersonation" means to knowingly and without consent impersonate a pupil for the purpose of bullying the pupil and such that another pupil would reasonably believe, or has reasonably believed, that the pupil was or is the pupil who was impersonated.
 - Creating a false provide for the purpose of having one or more of the effects listed above. "False profile" means a profile of a fictitious pupil or a profile using the likeness or attributes of an actual pupil other than the pupil who created the false profile.
- An electronic act shall not constitute pervasive conduct solely on the basis that it has been transmitted on the Internet or is currently posted on the Internet.
- A "reasonable pupil" means a pupil, including, but not limited to, an exceptional needs pupil, who exercises average care, skill and judgment in conduct for a person of his or her age, or for a person of his or her age with his or her exceptional needs.
- > Made terrorist threats against school officials and/or school property
- Committed sexual harassment
- Caused or participated in an act of hate violence
- Carried, possessed, sold or otherwise furnished an electronic signaling device
- Committed hazing
- Committed vandalism/malicious mischief
- Violated academic ethics
- > Falsified or misinterpreted notes or phone calls of parents or guardians
- > Falsely activated fire alarm
- > Habitually violated the dress code
- Intentionally harassed, threatened or intimidated a student or group of students to the extent of having the actual and reasonably expected effect of materially disrupting class work, creating substantial disorder and invading student rights by creating an intimidating or hostile educational environment
- Discriminated against, harassed, intimidated, and/or bullied any person or groups of persons based on the following actual or perceived characteristics: disability, gender, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, religion, or association with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.
- A pupil who aids or abets, as defined in section 31 of the Penal Code, the infliction or attempted infliction of physical injury to another person may be subject to suspension, but not expulsion, pursuant to this policy, except that a pupil who has been adjudged by a juvenile court to have committed, as an aider and abettor, a crime of physical violence in which the victim suffered great bodily injury or serious bodily injury may be recommended for expulsion.

The above list is not exhaustive and depending upon the offense, a pupil may be suspended or recommended for

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expulsion for misconduct not specified above.

Procedures Required to Suspend

Step One

The School Director shall investigate the incident and determine whether or not it merits suspension.

Searches: In order to investigate an incident, a student's attire, personal property, vehicle or school property, including books, desks and school lockers, may be searched by a Principal or designee who has reasonable suspicion that a student has violated or is violating the law or the rules of the school. *Illegally possessed items shall be confiscated and turned over to the police.*

Step Two

Unless a student poses a continuing danger to persons or property or an ongoing threat of disrupting the academic process, a suspension will be preceded by an informal conference between the School Director and the student in which the student shall be orally informed of the reason for the suspension, the evidence against him, and be given the opportunity to present informal proof of his/her side of the story. If the student poses a continuing danger to persons or property or an ongoing threat of disrupting the academic process, the informal conference will be held within two school days, unless the pupil waives this right or is physically unable to attend for any reason, including, but not limited to, hospitalization or detention in a correctional facility.

At the time of the suspension, a School employee shall make a reasonable effort to contact the parent/guardian by telephone or in person to inform him/her of the suspension and the reasons therefore.

If a student is suspended without the informal conference, both the student and the parent/guardian will be notified of a student's right to return to school for the purpose of a conference.

Step Three

The School determines the appropriate length of the suspension (up to 5 days). When suspensions do not include a recommendation for expulsion, they shall not exceed 5 consecutive school days per suspension.

Step Four

The School Director fills out a Notice of Suspension Form, a copy of which will be sent to the student's parent/guardian and to the student. A copy of this form is also placed in the student's cumulative file at the School. The Notice of Suspension Form shall state the fact of suspension, its duration and the specific offense committed by the student. In addition, the notice may state the date and time when the student may return to school. The notice shall also state that if desired by the parent/guardian, a prompt meeting or hearing will be held at which the suspension may be discussed and at which the student may be present and afforded an opportunity

This does not include removing clothing to permit visual inspection of the under clothing, breasts, buttocks or genitalia of the pupil.

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to present informal proof of his/her side of the case. Additionally, if the School officials wish to ask the parent/guardian to confer regarding matters pertinent to the suspension, the notice may request the parent/guardian to respond to such requests without delay.

Step Five

The School Director determines whether the offense warrants a police report. The School Director will report certain offenses to law enforcement authorities in accordance with Education Code section 48902.

When Director releases a minor pupil to a peace officer for the purpose of removing the minor from the school premises, the Director shall take immediate steps to notify the parent, guardian or responsible relative of the minor regarding the release of the minor to the officer and regarding the place to which the minor is reportedly being taken, unless the minor has been taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse.

Step Six

The School Director may require the student and his/her parent/guardian to sign a contract that states the conditions that the student is expected to meet while at the School. Copies of the signed contract are kept by the school and given to the parent/guardian.

Special Education Student Suspensions

When suspensions involve special education students, a manifestation determination meeting shall be held no later than the 10th suspension day (whether consecutive or cumulative for the school year). The School Director shall notify the student's special education teacher when the student's cumulative days of suspension for that school year reaches eight. That special education teacher shall promptly notify the Program Specialist of the need for the manifestation determination meeting. The manifestation determination meeting shall include the LEA, the parent, and relevant members of the student's IEP Team (as determined by the parent and the LEA).

The student shall be treated as a general education student for disciplinary purposes, except to the extent that educational services must continue, if at the manifestation determination meeting the following are both determined in the negative, after reviewing all relevant information in the student's file, including the student's IEP, any teacher observations and any relevant information provided by the parents: 1) the conduct in question was caused by, or had a direct and substantial relationship to, the student's disability; or 2) the conduct in question was the direct result of the LEA's failure to implement the IEP. If it is determined at the manifestation determination meeting that 1) or 2) is answered in the affirmative, the conduct is deemed a manifestation of the disability.

If the conduct is deemed a manifestation of the disability, the IEP Team must conduct a functional behavioral assessment, create a plan and implement it, or if the plan is preexisting, review it and modify it as necessary to address the behavior.

In the case of a manifestation of a disability, the student will be returned to the placement from which he/she was

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removed, unless the LEA and parent agree to a change of placement as part of the modification of the behavioral intervention plan. For special education students, a new manifestation determination meeting is required for all proposed suspensions exceeding ten cumulative days in one school year.

The special education student may be removed from school to an interim alternative educational setting for not more than 45 school days without regard to whether the behavior is determined to be a manifestation of the student's disability if the student: 1) carries a weapon to or possesses a weapon at school, on school premises or to or at a school function under the jurisdiction of the School; 2) knowingly possesses or uses illegal drugs or sells or solicits the sale of a controlled substance, while at school, on school premises, or at a school function under the jurisdiction of the School; or 3) has inflicted serious bodily injury upon another person while at school, on school premises, or at a school function under the jurisdiction of the School.

Appeal Process

A student or the student's parent/guardian may appeal those disciplinary actions, other than expulsion, imposed upon a student for his/her School related offenses. Appeals must be made first in writing at the School level, and should be directed to the School Director within five days of the School sending the Notice of Suspension Form to the parent/guardian and the student. The School Director will attempt to resolve the appeal with a written response within ten school days of receiving the written appeal. After appeal at the School level, if further appeal is desired, the student or his/her parent/guardian should appeal in writing to the School Board within five days of the date of the School level written response and should direct it to the Board Chair for final resolution within 15 school days. If any appeal is denied, the student, his/her parent/guardian may place a written rebuttal to the action in the student's file.

Expulsion

Definition

Expulsion means involuntary disenrollment from the charter school.

Authority

A student may be expelled either by the Board following a hearing before it or by the Board upon a recommendation of an Administrative Panel to be assigned by the Board as needed. The Panel may recommend expulsion of any student found to have committed an expellable offense.

The Board, upon voting to expel a pupil, may suspend the enforcement of the expulsion order for a period of not more than one calendar year and may, as a condition of the suspension of enforcement, assign the pupil to a school, class or program that is deemed appropriate for the rehabilitation of the pupil [or other conditions such as good behavior, attendance, etc.]. The rehabilitation program to which the pupil is assigned may provide for the involvement of the pupil's parent or guardian in his or her child's education in ways that are specified in the rehabilitation program. A parent or guardian's refusal to participate in the rehabilitation program shall not be considered in the Board's determination as to whether the pupil has satisfactorily completed the rehabilitation program.

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Grounds for Expulsion

<u>Category I Expulsions – Mandatory Recommendation for Expulsion</u>

The School Director shall immediately suspend a student, and recommend for expulsion, a student who has committed one or more of the following acts:

- Possessing, selling or otherwise furnishing a firearm when a school employee verifies firearm possession, unless the student obtained prior written permission to possess the firearm from a certificated school employee, which is concurred in by the director or his/her designee
- > Brandishing a knife at another person
- Unlawfully selling a controlled substance
- Committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault or committing a sexual battery
- Possession of an explosive

<u>Category II Expulsions – Recommendation for Expulsion Required, Unless Inappropriate Under the Circumstances</u>

A student who has committed one of the following acts of misconduct must be recommended for expulsion, unless the School Director determines that expulsion should not be recommended under the circumstances or that an alternative means of correction would address the conduct.

- > Causing physical injury to another person, except in self-defense
- > Possession of any knife, explosive or other dangerous object of no reasonable use to the student
- Unlawful possession of any controlled substance, except for the first offense for the possession of not more than one ounce of marijuana, other than concentrated cannabis or for possession of over-thecounter medication for use by the pupil for medical purposes or medication prescribed for the pupil by a physician
- Robbery or extortion
- Assault or battery on a school employee

Category III Expulsions - Discretionary Expulsion Recommendation

In the discretion of the School Director or his/her designee, any act that warrants suspension may warrant expulsion. Additionally, a student may be expelled for misconduct that is not listed above if the acts disrupt and/or present ongoing health and/or safety concerns, or the student has repeatedly engaged in the misconduct.

Procedures to Expel a Student

Step One

The School Director investigates the incident and determines whether the offense results in a suspension. If so, the School Director follows the procedures to suspend the student as outlined above.

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Step Two

In the discretion of the School Director, a student's suspension may be extended pending expulsion. In this case, a meeting is held within five school days of the student's suspension to extend the suspension. The student and his/her parent/guardian are invited to attend this meeting with the School Director or his/her designee. The Board Chair may also be present.

At this meeting, the offense and the repercussions are discussed. An extension of the suspension may be granted only if the School Director or his/her designee has determined, after the meeting, that the presence of the student at the School would cause a danger to persons or property or a threat of disrupting the instructional process. If the student has committed an offense that requires a mandatory expulsion recommendation, this is discussed so that it is understood by all parties. The purpose of the meeting is to decide upon the extension of the suspension order and may be held in conjunction with the initial meeting with the parents after the suspension.

Step Three

The School shall send a letter to the student and parent/guardian regarding the expulsion hearing. The expulsion hearing shall be held no later than 30 school days of the date that expulsion is recommended, unless a brief extension is requested by the student or his/her parent/guardian.

The letter shall be sent via certified mail to the student and his/her parent/guardian to the address reflected in the pupil's student file at least 10 calendar days before the date of the hearing. The letter shall notify the student and parent/guardian when and where the expulsion hearing will take place and the rights of the student with respect to the hearing, including:

- > The date and place of the expulsion hearing:
- > A statement of the facts, charges and offenses upon which the proposed expulsion is based;
- A copy of the School's disciplinary rules relating to the alleged violation;
- Notification of the student's or parent/guardian's obligation to provide information about the student's status at the School to any other school district or school to which the student seeks enrollment;
- > The opportunity for the student or the student's parent/guardian to appear in person and/or to employ and be represented by counsel or an advocate;
- > The right to inspect and obtain copies of all documents to be used at the hearing;
- The opportunity to confront and question witnesses who testify at the hearing;
- The opportunity to question all evidence presented and to present oral and documentary evidence on the student's behalf, including witness testimony.

Step Four

The School Director shall maintain documents that may be used at the hearing and make them available for review by the student and/or his/her parent/guardian. These papers may include, but are not limited to, the following: A record of the student's attendance and grades, a record of previous infractions, a statement of the facts surrounding the case made by the School Director; a statement of the facts surrounding the case made by a witness, a law enforcement agency's report and any other relevant matter.

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Step Five

An expulsion hearing shall be held before an Administrative Panel consisting of at least three members who are certificated and neither a teacher of the pupil or a Board member of The Walden Academy Board of Directors. A record of the hearing shall be made and may be maintained by any means, including electronic recording, as long as a reasonably accurate and a complete written transcription of the proceedings can be made.

While the technical rules of evidence do not apply to expulsion hearings, evidence may be admitted and used as proof only if it is the kind of evidence on which reasonable persons can rely in the conduct of serious affairs. A recommendation by the Administrative Panel to expel must be supported by substantial evidence that the student committed an expellable offense.

Findings of fact shall be based solely on evidence produced at the hearing. While hearsay evidence is admissible, no decision to expel shall be based solely on hearsay evidence, although sworn declarations may be admitted as testimony from witnesses who are determined by the Administrative Panel that disclosure of their identity or live testimony at the hearing may subject them to an unreasonable risk of physical or psychological harm.

If, due to a written request by the expelled pupil, the hearing is held at a public meeting, and the charge is committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault or committing a sexual battery as defined in Education Code section 48900, a complaining witness shall have the right to have his or her testimony heard in a session closed to the public.

Step Six

The decision of the Administrative Panel shall be in the form of a written recommendation, with findings of fact, to the Walden Academy Board of Directors who will make a final determination regarding the expulsion. The final decision by the Board shall be made within 10 days following the conclusion of the hearing, or within 40 school days after the date of the pupil's removal from the School for the incident for which the recommendation for expulsion is made. If the Board decides not to recommend expulsion, the pupil shall be reinstated and permitted to return to classroom programs. The decision not to recommend expulsion shall be final.

Step Seven

The School Director, or designee, following a decision of the Board of Directors to expel a student, shall send written notice of the decision to expel, including the School Director's findings of fact, to the student or parent/guardian. The notice shall include the following:

- Notice of the specific offense committed by the student; school
- Notice of the right to appeal the expulsion to the Board of Directors. If that Board does not hear such appeals, the student may submit a written objection and request for reconsideration to the school's Board of Directors within 10 days. Decisions of the Board of Directors shall be final.
- Notice of the student's or parent/guardian's obligation to inform any new district in which the student seeks to enroll of the student's status within the charter school

Within 30 days of the decision to expel, the School Director shall send written notice of the decision to expel to the

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student's district of residence, the County Office of Education and the charter granting district (if different than the student's district of residence). This notice shall include the student's name and the specific expellable offense committed by the student.

Step Eight

Expelled students are responsible for seeking alternative education programs, including but not limited to, programs within the County or their school district of residence.

Step Nine

The school shall maintain records of all student suspensions and expulsions at the school site. Such records shall be made available for the Board of Directors review upon request.

Students who are expelled from the charter school shall be given a rehabilitation plan upon expulsion as developed by the Board of Directors, or its designee, at the time of the expulsion order, which may include, but is not limited to, a periodic review as well as assessment at the time of review for readmission. The rehabilitation plan should include a date not later than one year from the date of expulsion when the pupil may reapply to the school for readmission.

The decision to readmit a pupil or to admit a previously expelled pupil from another school district or charter school shall be in the sole discretion of the Board of Directors or its designee following a meeting with the School Director and the pupil and parent/guardian to determine whether the pupil has successfully completed the rehabilitation plan and to determine whether the pupil poses a threat to others or will be disruptive to the school environment. The School Director shall make a recommendation to the Board of Directors following the meeting regarding his/her determination. The pupil's readmission is also contingent upon the school's capacity and any other admission requirements in effect at the time the student seeks admission or readmission.

Chapter 5000, Students Section 80, Independent Study Policy

The Walden Academy Board of Trustees are committed to providing options for students and to establishing an Independent Study Program for The Walden Academy Board of Trustees are committed to providing options for students and to establishing an Independent Study Program for Walden Academy. The Independent Study Program shall provide as an alternative instructional strategy to regular classroom instruction for students enrolled in grades K-12 to reach curriculum objectives and fulfill graduation requirements. Independent Study shall offer a means of individualizing the educational plan for students who have difficulty functioning in a regular classroom environment.

The Superintendent/designee shall determine that the prospective independent study student and/or the parent or guardian understand and are prepared to meet the county office of education's requirements for independent study. Independent study entails a commitment by both the parent/guardian and the student. Independent study may be offered only to students who can achieve in this program as well as or better than they would in the regular classroom.

The Superintendent/designee shall ensure that a written independent study agreement, as prescribed by law, exists for each participating student. To foster each student's success in independent study, the Board establishes the following maximum lengths of time which may elapse between the time an assignment is made and date by which the student must complete the assigned work shall be:

2 weeks for all students grades TK-8.

When circumstances justify a longer time, the Superintendent/designee may extend the maximum length of an assignment one additional week. For good cause, the Superintendent/designee may extend this period, up to four weeks. Such an extension may be made only pursuant to a written request with justification.

When any student fails to complete consecutive independent study assignments **consisting of 60% or more of total work**, an evaluation shall be conducted to determine whether it is in the student's best interest to remain in independent study. Evaluation findings shall be kept in the student's permanent record.

Upon satisfactory completion of the program objectives, the assigned teacher shall verify completion of work, grades, and earned credit, such credit to be entered into the student's permanent record. Credit given shall not exceed that which is available in the regular school for that student.

The Superintendent shall establish and provide the necessary and appropriate forms and regulations to carry out this policy.

Independent Study Instruction

Independent Study Walden Academy has adopted a policy to implement the requirements of AB 130. With the enactment of Assembly Bill No. 130 (Ch. 44, Stats. 2021, hereafter "AB 130"), school districts and county offices of education may offer independent study with limited exceptions.

This Regulation is intended to implement the additional requirements of AB 130.

Monitoring Student Progress

In addition to the number of missed assignments permitted by Walden Academy before an evaluation is conducted to determine whether it is in the best interest of a pupil to remain in independent study, or whether the pupil should return to the regular school program, the pupil's level of satisfactory progress shall be considered.

Satisfactory educational progress shall be determined based on all of the following indicators:

- 1. The pupil's achievement and engagement in the independent study program, as indicated by the pupil's performance on applicable pupil-level measures of pupil achievement and pupil engagement, including but not limited to the student's attendance and absenteeism.
- 2. The completion of assignments, assessments, or other indicators that evidence that the pupil is working on assignments.
- 3. Learning required concepts, as determined by the supervising teacher.
- 4. Progressing toward successful completion of the course of study or individual course, as determined by the supervising teacher.

Special Education Students Participating in Independent Study

Students enrolled in special education programs may participate in independent study if the Individual Education Plan (IEP) Team agrees and Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) can be established. The "certificated employee with responsibility for the student's special education programming" must be a signatory to the written agreement.

Content Standards

The provision of content aligned to grade level standards that is provided to pupils in the independent study program shall be substantially equivalent to in-person instruction.

Re-engagement Strategies

Walden Academy employees will take measures to re-engage pupils who are not generating attendance for more than 10 percent of required minimum instructional time over four continuous weeks of approved instructional calendar, pupils found non-participatory in synchronous instructional offerings pursuant to Section 51747.5 for more than 50 percent of the scheduled times of synchronous instruction in a school month as applicable by grade span, or pupils who are in violation of their written agreement pursuant to Educational Code section 51747 (g), and this policy. Procedures for tiered re-engagement strategies shall include all of the following:

1. Verification of the pupil's current contact information.

- 2. Notification to parents or guardians of lack of participation within one school day of the absence or lack of participation.
- 3. A plan for outreach to determine pupil needs, including connection with health and social services as necessary.
- 4. A clear standard for requiring a pupil-parent-educator conference to review a pupil's written agreement and reconsider the independent study program's impact on the pupil's achievement and well-being, consistent with the provisions of this policy regarding missed assignments and satisfactory education progress.

"Pupil-parent-educator conference" means a meeting involving, at a minimum, all parties who signed the pupil's written independent study agreement pursuant to subdivision (g) of Section 51747 or the written learning agreement pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 51749.6.

This section shall not apply to pupils that participate in an independent study program for fewer than 15 school days in a school year.

<u>Instructional Delivery Methods</u>

Instruction shall be provided to all pupils in the independent study program in accordance with the pupil's written agreement, and shall include the following:

- 1. For pupils in transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 3, inclusive, daily synchronous instruction shall be provided for all pupils throughout the school year.
- 2. Pupils in grades 4 to 8, inclusive, will be provided opportunities for both daily live interaction and at least weekly synchronous instruction for all pupils throughout the school year.
- 2. Pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, will be provided opportunities for at least weekly synchronous instruction for all pupils throughout the school year.

"Live interaction" means interaction between the pupil and Walden Academy classified or certificated staff, and may include peers, provided for the purpose of maintaining school connectedness, including, but not limited to, wellness checks, progress monitoring, provisions of services, and instruction. This interaction may take place in person, or in the form of internet or telephonic communication.

"Synchronous instruction" means classroom-style instruction or designated small group or one-on-one instruction delivered in person, or in the form of internet or telephonic communications, and involving live two-way communication between the teacher and pupil. Synchronous instruction shall be provided by the teacher of record for that pupil pursuant to Education Code Section 51747.5. A pupil who does not participate in independent study on a school day shall be documented as non-participatory for that school day for purposes of pupil participation reporting and tiered re-engagement pursuant to section 51447.

Returning to In-person Instruction

Pupils whose families wish to return to classroom-based instruction from independent study may notify the designated contact person, as set forth in the pupil's written agreement. Upon notice from the pupil's family that a return to in-person instruction is desired, the Site Administrator shall provide for the pupil's return to the school of the pupil's previous in-person attendance, or such other school as is appropriate for

the pupil's grade level and place of residence, no later than five instructional days after the request is received.

This section shall not apply to pupils that participate in an independent study program for fewer than 15 schooldays in a school year.

Independent Study Fewer Than Fifteen Days

Written agreements for independent study lasting fewer than 15 school days must be signed by parent/guardian within 10 days of enrollment in independent study.

Master Agreement

Each pupil's written agreement for independent study shall include, in addition to those provisions required by Walden Academy, the following:

- 1. The manner, time, frequency, and place for reporting the pupil's academic progress, and for communicating with a pupil's parent or guardian regarding the pupil's academic progress.
- 2. The specific resources, including materials and personnel, that will be made available to the pupil. These resources shall include confirming or providing access to all pupils to the connectivity and devices adequate to participate in the educational program and complete assigned work.
- 3. A statement of the level of satisfactory educational progress allowed before an evaluation of whether or not the pupil should be allowed to continue in independent study.
 - 3. A statement detailing the academic and other supports that will be provided to address the needs of the pupils are not performing at grade level, or need support in other areas, such as English learners, individuals with exceptional needs in order to be consistent with the pupil's individualized education program or plan pursuant to Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 794), pupils in foster care or experiencing homelessness, and pupils requiring mental health supports.

Signed written agreements, supplemental agreements, assignment records, work samples, and attendance records assessing time value of work or evidence that an instructional activity occurred may be maintained as an electronic file. An electronic file includes a computer or electronic stored image of an original document, including, but not limited to, portable document format, JPEG, or other digital image file type, that may be sent via fax machine, email, or other electronic means. Either an original document or an electronic file of the original document is allowable for auditing purposes.

Written agreements may be signed using an electronic signature that complies with state and federal standards that may be a marking that is either computer generated or produced by electronic means and is intended by the signatory to have the same effect as a handwritten signature. The use of an electronic signature shall have the same force and effect as the use of a manual signature if the requirements for digital signatures and their acceptable technology, as provided in Section 16.5 of the Government Code and in Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 22000) of Division 7 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, are satisfied.

Each pupil's written agreement must be completed and signed by parent, student, and teacher prior to program commencement for programs scheduled for 15 days or more.

Independent Study Enrollment and Notice

Upon the request of the parent or guardian of a pupil, and before signing a written agreement with the pupil's parent or guardian, the Walden Academy staff may conduct a phone, videoconference, or in-person pupil-parent-educator conference or other school meeting during which the pupil, parent, or guardian, and, if requested by the pupil or parent, an education advocate, may ask questions about the educational options, including which curriculum offerings and nonacademic supports will be available to the pupil in independent study, before making the decision about enrollment or disenrollment in the various options for learning.
